Grading is viewed as a complex process that serves multiple roles: evaluation, motivation, communication, and organization. It is important that grades accurately reflect the quality of student work, and that student work is graded fairly. Grading with accuracy and fairness can take a lot of time. Efficient grading provides students with feedback on their own learning, motivates them when they do well, helps them track their learning, clarifies for them what they got right or wrong and where they can improve. Grading also provides feedback to instructors on their

	students' learning, helping them determine the extent to which students are achieving the learning objectives and outcomes.
