Experiential Learning (EL) and High-Impact Practices 101

Description:

For the first part of this session, you will learn from subject matter experts what EL and HIPs are, why they matter including research, and how they are embedded into the curriculum. EL and HIPs foundations including the basic requirements for making your course a "High-Impact Practice" course will be discussed. For the second part of this session, you will hear directly from a panel of eight BSU faculty members about how they planned, facilitated, and assessed various experiential learning activities into their courses to engage students including study abroad, intensive writing, community-based/service learning, project-based learning, internships, and undergraduate research. The session will end with an open discussion and a Q&A with the faculty panel.

Outcomes:

1. Identify EL/HIPs activities and the research of why EL/HIPs matters
2. Highlight the foundations and requirements for making a course a high-impact practice
3. Discuss with faculty already engaged in EL/HIPs how they have embedded EL/HIPs in their courses

Description:

For this session you will learn from a subject matter expert how to maximize the impacts of EL/HIPs in an individual course and throughout a program's curriculum. The session will go beyond the basic requirements for making your course a "High-Impact Practice" course, and focus on a deeper dive into detailed, real examples of HIPs courses and what makes those courses high-impact. Topics to be covered include designing a syllabus, HIPs pedagogy, student interactions with faculty and peers, and EL/HIPs assessment with an emphasis on reflection and reflection activities/templates. Additionally, faculty will break into small groups to customize their reflection templates for their courses and participate in discussion around questions and comments on reflection activities. Additionally, this session will introduce faculty to the PeopleGrove Experiential Learning System (formerly SOC) and walk faculty through the process for applying for BSU's Experiential Learning Course Designation.

Outcomes:

1. Detail and discuss the advanced pedagogy approaches for EL/HIPs
2. Sketch out and discuss how EL/HIPs can be incorporated into existing courses
3. Apply for BSU's Experiential Learning Designation in the PeopleGrove EL System
