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
1) DR. SHAKIL RABBI JOINS DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH & MODERN LANGUAGES



Dr. Shakil Rabbi has joined our department as an Assistant Professor specializing in Rhetoric and Composition. Dr. Rabbi earned his Ph.D. from Pennsylvania State University in 2017. His research interests include academic literacies, multilingualism, and writing; the place of writing studies in the university; and the rhetoric of public intellectuals. Description

This internship, generously funded by a grant from the Henry B. Luce Foundation, is intended to broaden opportunities for undergraduates who are passionate about a career in the arts, whose backgrounds or experiences are underrepresented in art museums, and who are committed to making museums more inclusive and pluralistic. Individuals from groups historically underrepresented in the curatorial field are especially encouraged to apply.

The Luce intern will work 8 to 12 weeks (June-August 2018) under the direction of the curator of American art and the department's curatorial research fellow, assisting with our *Whistler Watercolor Initiative* that includes an exhibition opening in 2019, print and on-line catalogues, and special programs. The intern will learn about all aspects of curatorial work and gain exposure to other professional and scholarly opportunities within the museum.

Qualifications

Applicants must be pursuing or have just completed an undergraduate degree in the arts or humanities (e.g. art history, history, studio art, digital humanities, English, or American Studies); have a record of academic accomplishment; a strong interest in museum work; and possess excellent writing and oral communication skills.

Compensation

The internship carries a stipend of \$500/week. Round trip travel to Washington, DC, will be reimbursed up to \$500. Housing is not provided.

5) INTERNSHIP OPPORTUNITY: PRODUCTION ASSISTANTS FOR WRITERS' HAVEN

About Us

The Writer's Haven Show (www.writershavenshow.com), hosted by author and filmmaker V. Helena, showcases the work of nationally and internationally known authors, directors and producers. It is a place where artists speak of their passion, process, and projects to inspire others with the same endeavor. The format of the show includes one-on-one interviews with the artists, panel discussions with industry insiders, and breaking industry news. The show is in its 2nd season and kicks off with an interview with NY Times best-selling author, Connie Briscoe followed by interviews with best-selling authors Tina McElroy Ansa, Lolita Files, Marita Golden, Victor McGlothin and international award-winning filmmaker, Haila Gerima.

Internship Program

Our volunteer student interns (Production Assistants) will work up to 40 hours a month, which translate to 4-6 shows devoting 5-7 hours (including pre- and post-production work) per show. There are two categories of interns working on the show—those that will primarily assist in the pre-production planning of the show, and those that will primarily assist in production and post-production planning. Both categories will be responsible for performing production duties the day of taping. We have two taping slots that are scheduled Monday through Thursday from 3:30pm thru 6:30pm, and 7:00pm thru 9:00pm. Interns are able to work either or

both time slots. Although most of our shows are shot in the studio, there will also be opportunities for field productions during the season.

The Creative Writing (CW) student interns will be primarily assigned to work on pre-production projects with the producer. Duties include reviewing the literary work of guest authors on the show, and provide critical feedback on the work based on prescribed criteria. In addition, the CW interns will be assigned specific authors to ensure the producers obtain all show related pre-production materials (e.g., author bios, books, promo/media packages, related photos) and work with the author and producer in scheduling tapings. In addition, the CW interns will work on the set with the production crew staff on the day of taping to set up the green room, check in guests, and exchange show related information between the guests and producer or crew as necessary. Lastly, the interns will work with Phoenix Rizen Entertainment staff in drafting promotion and marketing information for the show, including working with local business owners in promoting the show through their sponsorship.

Internship will be performed without compensation, and as a volunteer, we encourage you to take advantage of this opportunity to enhance your study in the art of writing and film/video production.

7) ONE-YEAR MA IN TEACHING DEGREE AT LOYOLA UNIVERSITY MARYLAND







FULL-TIME, ONE-YEAR PROGRAM PROFILE

The full-time, one-year Master of Arts in Teaching is an intensive program that prepares future teachers to meet the needs of the 21st century learner. Loyola's School of Education stands strong on its commitments to social justice and equity which are infused throughout our curriculum, clinical experiences, and mentorship. Loyola also has an urban scholars program designed for candidates particularly interested in teaching in urban communities. Choose whether you'd like to join our Elementary or Secondary track and—in just one year—this accelerated format will build upon the strong foundation you acquired as an undergraduate and propel you in the exciting career of teaching.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

Completion of the full-time, one-year Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) program and satisfactory scores on the required teacher licensure exams will lead to Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) certification.

MASTER OF ARTS IN TEACHING ELEMENTARY (GRADES 1-6)

The elementary education program requires an undergraduate major in one of the four content areas (mathematics, science, English, or social studies, or another closely related area) and/or a well-rounded liberal arts background, including courses in science, mathematics, English, and social studies, Social studies include economics, geography, history, philosophy, political science, psychology, and sociology.

MASTER OF ARTS INTEACHING SECONDARY (GRADES7-12) AND (GRADES PK-12)

The secondary education program requires an undergraduate major (or 27-30 sufficient credits) in the certification area in which the aspiring teacher is seeking certification.

We offer concentrations in biology, chemistry, earth/space science, physics, English, mathematics, or social studies in grades 7-12.

In addition, we have programs in art, French, music (vocal or instrumental), or Spanish which apply to grades PK-12,

Social studies include majors in economics, geography, history, philosophy, political science, psychology, and sociology.

ELEMENTARY CERTIFICATION FORMAT

The full-time, one-year MAT is completed in one year (summer-spring). Students will complete 15 credits in the summer, 12 credits in the fall (which includes Internship I), and II credits in the spring (which includes Internship II). During the summer, all courses are offered in the evening and last approximately six weeks.

SECONDARY CERTIFICATION FORMAT

The full-time, one-year MAT is completed in one year (summer-spring). Students will complete 12 credits in the summer, 13 credits in the fall (which includes internship I), and 9 credits in the spring (which includes internship II). During the summer, all courses are offered in the evening and last approximately six weeks.

CLINICAL EXPERIENCE

This program includes two 20-hour field placements designed to provide the student with exposure to school classroom operations prior to the internship.

- Internship I consists of teaching one or two days a week for a semester after initial consecutive full-time orientation days.
- Internship II follows the schedule of the local school system for the semester.

The candidate must have a minimum of a B or equivalent average in English and in general scholarship and must have completed at least three semesters or five quarters of college course work. Candidates for undergraduate membership need not be majoring or minoring in the discipline of English.
- •Candidates for graduate membership who did not hold undergraduate membership must be enrolled in a graduate program in English or one of its specializations, have completed six semester hours of graduate work or the equivalent, and have a minimum grade point average of 3.3 on a 4.0 scale.
- •Lifetime Membership Fee: \$80. \$40 goes to the Nu Nu chapter, which will bestow you with Honor Cords and a Medallion at your Induction Ceremony that you can wear during graduation. The other \$40 goes to Sigma Tau Delta's national office, which will supply you with your Sigma Tau Delta society pin and certificate. The fee must be paid in cash.
