
Academic Success In Multiple Homes

- **GPA (Range: 2.5-2.99 & 3.0-3.499)**
- Single Parent Households N = 21; Two Parent Households N = 22

RESULTS

Single Parent Homes vs. Double Parent Homes and Having A Higher GPA

DISCUSSION

The results of this study suggest the following:

*There is no significant difference from single parent households and double parent households when it comes to academic success and as far as having a high GPA.
