


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HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE OF THE DEPARTMENT OF NURSING

Bowie State University (BSU), founded in 1865, is the oldest Historically Black College and University in Maryland and one of the 10 oldest in the country. Bowie State College joined the University System of Maryland in 1988 and became Bowie State University. Throughout the years, BSU has built upon its proud heritage by providing educational opportunities in a broad array of curriculum areas for a diverse population of students. The number and variety of programs offered at the institution has expanded throughout its history without losing focus on its primary mission and commitment to the African American Community.

The Department of Nursing (DON), one of five (5) departments in the College of Professional Studies, was established in 1979 to offer the Registered Nurse to Bachelor of Science in Nursing (RN to BSN) degree. The RN to BSN program was the first freestanding Baccalaureate Nursing Program in the state. The department offers two academic programs: the Undergraduate Program and the Graduate Program. The Undergraduate Program is the largest in the university with more than 500 students enrolled. Students are admitted to the Undergraduate Program into one of three options: Traditional, Accelerated or RN to BSN Completion. The traditional option began in 2002 and the accelerated program was introduced in 2009. The accelerated option provides students who have earned a prior degree or extensive transfer credits an opportunity to complete the nursing program in fewer semesters than the traditional option.

The RN to BSN Baccalaureate Nursing Program was granted initial accreditation by the National League for Nursing Accreditation Commission (NLNAC) in 1988. The Maryland Board of Nursing approved initiation of a traditional Baccalaureate Nursing Program in the spring of 2001. The Baccalaureate Nursing Program has received continuous accreditation by the Accreditation Commission for Nursing Education (ACEN—formerly NLNAC) since 1988.

The Graduate Program was established in 1989. The Master of Science in Nursing degree program provides two areas of concentration: Family Nurse Practitioner and Nurse Educator. Initial accreditation of the graduate program was granted by NLNAC in 1993. The Graduate Program remains accredited.

Graduates of the Undergraduate Program in the Department of Nursing are prepared to become leaders, consumers of research and collaborative members of the health care team. Master of Science in Nursing graduates are prepared to implement the Family Nurse Practitioner or Nurse Educator role, engage in research, pursue doctoral study and contribute to healthcare policies that impact the health of individuals and communities. Our graduates are all well prepared to become lifelong learners who will continue racing to excellence in nursing practice.

Inaugural Dean



Dr. Kenya Beard, EdD, AGACNP-BC, ANEF, FAAN, Dean and Professor at Mercy College's School of Nursing has spent over 35 years of her nursing career committed to dismantling health care disparities and leading efforts to advance health equity. Whether consulting with schools on designing a multicultural curriculum that upholds social mission, becoming a primary investigator on a million-dollar workforce diversity grant, serving as a reviewer for the Future of Nursing's 2020-2030 report, an Advisory Board Member for the New York Academy of Medicine Health Equity Scholars, or collaborating with the National League for Nursing's Taking Aim Initiative, Dr. Beard has continuously amplified the ideals of social mission.

As a 2012 Macy Faculty Scholar, she founded the Center for Multicultural Education and Health Disparities and in 2014, as a Senior Fellow at the Center for Health Policy and Media Engagement, she co-produced healthcare disparity segments on WBAI-FM for over 400,000 listeners. More recently, to advance racial equity, she co-authored the National Academy of Medicines' Perspectives entitled *Dismantling Systemic Racism*

and Advancing Health Equity throughout Research and the National Commission to Address Racism in Nursing's foundational report, 2022 Racism in Nursing as a Commissioner for the National League of Nursing. To support the transition of nurses from clinician to educator, she established the nation's first Nurse Faculty Residency program at Chamberlain University.

Dr. Beard is a staunch advocate for social justice. Her work has earned her numerous awards. Last year, the National Association of Health Services Executives, NY Regional Chapter, awarded her the prestigious President's Award. In 2022, the National Black Nurses Association honored her with the Trailblazer award.

Dr. Beard Chairs the New York State Board of Nursing. She is a fellow of the New York Academy of Medicine, the American Academy of Nursing, and the Academy of Nursing Education. She serves on the editorial board for the American Journal of Nursing and on the American Academy of Nursing's Institute for Nursing Leadership.

ACADEMIC AWARDS

The Student of Distinction Award: Presented to the graduate or undergraduate student who has distinguished oneself in clinical nursing practice, academic achievement, leadership and professional or community services during their entire tenure in the BSU Nursing Program.

Pioneer in Nursing Award: Presented to the graduate or undergraduate student who, in the opinion of the faculty, has persevered in completing all requirements for the degree, despite personal and professional challenges.

Outstanding Academic Development Award: Presented to the graduate or undergraduate student who, in the opinion of the faculty, demonstrated academic growth and progress throughout their academic studies.

Florence Nightingale Award: In the opinion of the faculty, this award is presented to the student who has exemplified the application of the most caring nursing behaviors toward her patients/clients. Florence Nightingale (1820-1910) was a British nurse, social reformer and statistician. Known as the founder of modern nursing, she was often called "the Lady with the Lamp," because she would enter the soldiers' wards at night with a lantern in her hand and attend to their physical and psychological needs.

Mary Elizabeth Mahoney Award: Presented to the student who reported that they are the first one in their family to complete a Bachelor of Science in Nursing Degree (BSN). Mary Elizabeth Mahoney, (1845-1926) was the first African American to graduate from the nursing school at New England Hospital for Women and Children in 1879 at the age of 34. She is known not only for her outstanding personal career, but also for her exemplary contributions to local and national professional organizations. Mahoney inspired both nurses and patients with her calm, quiet efficiency and untiring compassion.

Certificate of Excellence in Nursing Specialty: Presented to a graduate or undergraduate student who demonstrated both theoretical and clinical excellence in caring, compassion, critical thinking, leadership and professionalism in a specialty area.

Academic Excellence Award: Presented to a graduate or undergraduate student who has achieved and maintained the highest Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) during their academic studies in the BSU Nursing Program.



THE SYMBOLISM OF THE MSN NURSING MEDALLION

The ceremonious bestowing of the medallion is symbolic of a "rite of passage" which signals the transition from a Bachelor of Science Registered Nurse to the Master of Science prepared Registered Nurse. One who is prepared to sit for the specialty certification as a "Family Nurse Practitioner. The Bowie State University school of nursing medallion is a mark of distinction, rich in history and meaning. The bestowing of the medallion grew out of the concept that can be traced back to the Florence Nightingale era in which the nurses were awarded a badge with a Maltese Cross. The wearing of the school medallion is a unique way of recognizing school affiliation. The medallion denotes nursing excellence and service to others. It signifies acceptance of the responsibility of the practice of nursing and the advanced educational level of achievement of the graduate.

The MSN is the degree awarded to graduate students who will receive a medallion with a black ribbon to be placed ceremoniously around the neck. The opened book represents the challenges and accomplishments of the graduates of the program. The Bowie State University flame logo atop the book denotes the flame of faith and the torch of truth that is reflected in the Bowie State University Alma Mata school song.

The double circle represents continual progression and feedback which students engaged in as they completed school requirements. The flow of arches surrounding the pin represents students' diverse cultures, gender and other characteristics that fulfill the "Great Mission of Bowie State University."



THE SYMBOLISM OF THE BSN NURSING PIN

The Pinning Ceremony is symbolic of a "rite of passage" which signals the transition from student nurse to professional nurse. The school of nursing pin is a mark of distinction, rich in history and meaning. It can be traced back to the concept of heraldry, which is the system of devising and granting insignias for coats of arm. The wearing of the school pin is a unique way of recognizing school affiliation. The pin denotes nursing excellence and service to others. It signifies acceptance of the responsibility of the practice of nursing and the educational preparation of the wearer.

The Bowie State University nursing pin insignia was designed historically by students and faculty to represent the challenges and achievements of the nursing profession. The BS on the insignia was the original degree awarded to RN students. The students are currently in the traditional nursing program and the insignia is BSN. The Bowie State University flame logo atop the book denotes the flame of faith and the torch of truth that is reflected in the Bowie State University Alma Mater.

The double circle represents continual progression and feedback which students engaged in as they completed school requirements. The flow of arches surrounding the pin represents students' diverse cultures, gender and other characteristics, which fulfill the mission of Bowie State University.

Nightingale Pledge

"I solemnly pledge myself before God and in the presence of the assembly to:

Pass my life in purity and to practice my profession faithfully. I will abstain from whatever is deleterious and mischievous and will not take, or knowingly administer any harmful drug.

I will do all in my power to maintain and elevate the standard of my profession and will hold in confidence all personal matters committed to my keeping, and all family affairs coming to my knowledge in the practice of my calling..."

[We pledge to engage in inter-professional collaborative practice with physicians and other healthcare team members to plan and implement individualized, safe and patient-centered care]
