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## EDITORIAL

### MORGAN INTERCOLLEGIATE CONFERENCE

On Saturday, February 26, 1966 at 11:30 A.M., an Intercollegiate Conference was held at Morgan State College. The Conference, attended by representatives from the state colleges of Frostburg, Maryland, Coppin, Salisbury, Towson, and Bowie, is a continuation of the first conference held at Bowie on January 16, 1966.

The Morgan conference discussed the establishment of an association designed to combat state college problems, and to make uniform policies common to all. It was adopted that the state college student governments be incorporated into the constitution of the proposed Maryland Association of Student Governments as a standing committee. If incorporated, the Maryland state colleges will receive assistance from the larger colleges of Maryland, while also retaining the power to call intercollegiate conferences of the state colleges concerned. This will insure the state college student governments of membership in the state association, as well as present the state colleges with opportunities to call meetings relevant only to the state colleges involved.

The intercollegiate conference plan, established as a problem-solving conference, is held monthly for the discussion of possible solutions for common problems, and to propose suggestions on how college administration objectives maybe achieved without conflicting with student's rights. Perhaps in this respect, the conferences may be of assistance to Bowie.

## THE BOWIE ART SHOW

## A G K BOOK REVIEW

William Goldman's Boys and Girls Together, is the blistering bestseller that keenly penetrates the world of today's young and uncompromising generation. Long and detailed, the novel is divided into sub-books which trace and develop the lives of each of the several main characters. The novel is at times shocking, since the author presents two young homosexuals as main characters. One is a caustic and bitter young man, Aaron. The other, Branch, is an inane mass of blubber.

Each main character in the novel is of a different background, a different attitude, and from a different geographical location. By the time the reader is thoroughly acquainted with the lives and growth of each, the main characters are thrown together at a party in New York. Each is trying to find his place in the world. Each is seeking a new start and a new way of life, yet, by the end of the party, each one's dream is shattered.

What makes the novel worth reading is neither the illicit love affairs therein, nor the abnormalities of the characters Mr. Goldman presents.

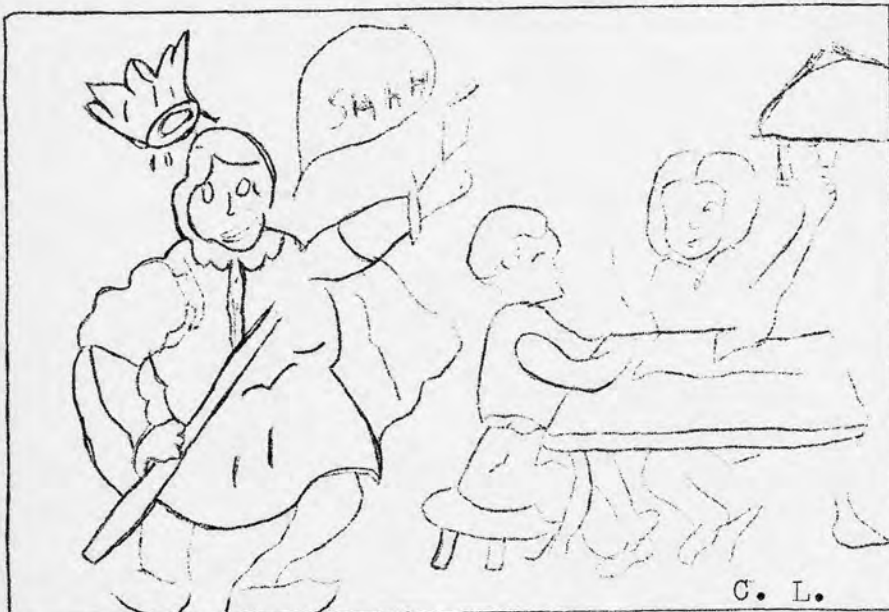
Junior - Frank Smith says, "If the grievance committee obtains the respect of the persons of whom they come in contact, and if they just improve themselves, I think much can be accomplished."
