ARTICULATION AGREEMENT

Montgomery College, Associate of Applied Science in Criminal Justice

Bowie State University, Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice, Social Justice Concentration

Montgomery College (MC), a community college in Montgomery County, Maryland, and Bowie State University (BSU), Bowie, Maryland, regionally accredited by Middle States, agree to offer an articulated program leading to the award of an Associate Applied Science (A.A.S.) in Criminal Justice and a Bachelor of Science (B.S) in Criminal Justice, Social Justice Concentration. They further agree that students from MC, through this articulation agreement, will be allowed to transfer credits earned for the A.A.S. at MC to BSU, leading to the award of the baccalaureate degree at Bowie State University.

Purpose of the Agreement

This agreement is entered into to serve the instructional needs of MC students and graduates. Its general purpose is to make clear the terms of the transfer.

By doing so, this articulation agreement will facilitate an efficient transition from MC's A.A.S. Criminal Justice to the B.S. Criminal Justice, Social Justice Concentration at Bowie State University. MC graduates will understand how Bowie State University transfers the credits they earn at MC, as well as the changes in requirements that may permit more flexible scheduling once the student has been admitted to and enrolled at Bowie State University. The agreement provides a systematic plan for students to continue their higher education beyond the A.A.S. degree from MC.

The agreement, also, is a publication of a clear set of understandings and expectations for both institutions and programs. Making expectations clear to students and between institutions not only contributes to the first goal, but also allows the institutions to work collaboratively to meet the needs of MC graduates. Like any policy agreement, this articulation agreement will need to be updated, revised and refined as the instructional programs are revised.

Finally, the agreement encourages MC graduates to continue their educational pathway for both personal and professional development, as well as career advancement. It facilitates students' successful achievement of credentials in their field.

Guiding Principles

The following general principles guide the operation of this Agreement:

- 1. The program is designed for graduates of the Associate of Applied Science degree in Criminal Justice at MC. Students who complete the A.A.S. in Criminal Justice under this agreement will be granted an application fee waiver.
- 2. A maximum of 65 credit hours from MC will be allowed toward fulfillment of the 120 credit hours required for baccalaureate completion.
- 3. All courses meeting general education requirements at MC will transfer to BSU as general education.

- 4. Students must maintain a 2.0 cumulative grade point average in order to transfer.
- 5. Maryland community college students who have completed the associate degree or students who have completed 56 semester hours of credit with a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 or higher on a scale of 4.0 shall not be denied direct transfer to a Maryland public four-year institution.
- 6. Students are required to earn at least a "C" grade in all courses in order for the course grade to be eligible for transfer credit unless it is a general education course. FRSE101 requirement is waived for students who complete the A.A.S. degree in Criminal Justice.
- 7. The maximum number of credits that will be accepted by Bowie State University toward degree requirements from non-direct classroom instruction (including CLEP, AP, and other nationally recognized standardized examination scores) is 30.
- 8. Once the A.A.S. is completed and the student has been admitted to Bowie State University the student may commence the Criminal Justice program by completing a "Declaration of Major" form and registering for courses.
- 9. While MC and Bowie State University do not presently have a dual enrollment program should one be agreed to, this agreement will not preclude students from participation and students may apply for and receive the benefits of dual enrollment. Those students would then be subject to the policies of said program should they apply.
- 10. MC students who have completed the Associate of Applied Science in Criminal Justice will be given every consideration for financial assistance and will be eligible to compete for academic scholarships at BSU.
- This agreement becomes effective on the date set forth on the first page of this document. Montgomery College and Bowie State University agree to publicize this program. They further agree to monitor the performance of this agreement and to review this agreement biennially. Any modification of this Agreement must be made between the institutions in writing and signed by all parties. The initial term of this Agreement shall be two years, with three (3) automatic renewals of two years each, subject to termination notice requirements. The agreement may be terminated by either party for due cause and after 60 days' notice to the other. Termination of the agreement will not affect any students currently enrolled at MC in the Criminal Justice program at the time of termination, and they shall be able to transfer credits pursuant to this agreement.
- 12. Bowie State University will establish a mechanism to provide information on the academic progress of the MC student enrolled as a result of this agreement.
